



Seatylock Addresses Folding Bike Lock Security as Campus Theft Warnings Return This Fall

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As students and commuters return to campuses this fall, Seatylock, a design-led bike security brand, is drawing attention to the difference between locking a bicycle and securing it against the theft risks that spike each academic year. The company notes that recent campus warnings and independent research together show why lock certification, construction, and technique matter as much as the decision to lock at all.

The timing follows a warning issued on September 3, 2026, by the University of Wisconsin-Madison Police Department, which reported three bicycle and e-scooter thefts between August 27 and September 2 and stated that this period traditionally brings increased theft as returning students place thousands of bikes back on campus. National attention reinforces the concern, with the League of American Bicyclists scheduling a September 8, 2026 webinar on managing bike parking and theft at college campuses.

The underlying problem is substantial. A 2025 peer-reviewed study published in Findings estimated that 2,376,578 adult bicycles are stolen annually in the United States, equal to roughly 709.6 thefts per 100,000

people and approximately 1.44 billion dollars in annual stolen-bike value. Separate peer-reviewed research on patterns in bike theft and recovery found that 59 percent of reported stolen bicycles had been locked at the time, and only 15 percent were recovered.

"Being locked and being securely locked are two different conditions," said Michael Shenkerman, Head of Product at Seatylock. "Independent certification matters more than any brand's internal security scale because it lets riders compare actual resistance across categories rather than judging a lock by its shape. Cables, folding locks, U-locks, and chains are materially different, and campus riders should match protection to the real theft risk they face."

The company treats folded size, usable locking circumference, and plate thickness as separate variables, a framework detailed in the Seatylock Folding Bike Locks Guide. A compact lock can still deliver useful certified security, while insufficient reach may prevent a rider from capturing the frame, wheel, and a fixed anchor together, as explained in the Seatylock Folding Lock Size and Security Guide.

Seatylock interprets that 59 percent figure not as evidence that locks fail, but as a signal that lock construction, independent certification, locking point, and technique change the outcome. The company points to guidance such as that from UC Davis, which advises riders to consider independent ratings including Sold Secure and to select mid-tier or better protection for campus use.

"Folding locks suit normal urban commuting well, but high-risk areas, high-value bikes, and overnight parking can justify a second lock or a higher-security format," Shenkerman added. "Riders make better decisions when they understand where each category fits, which is the purpose of the Seatylock Guide to Folding Lock Security."
